Michael Blomgren, Ph.D., CCC-SLP

Dr. Blomgren is an Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Communication Disorders at the University of Utah. He completed his B.Sc. in Psychology and Linguistics (University of Victoria, 1989), his M.S. in Speech Pathology (University of Hawaii, 1991), and his Ph.D. in Communication Science (University of Connecticut, 1999).
